

June 13, 2023

A meeting of the County Commissioners of Kent County was called to order at 6:00 p.m. with the following present: Ronald H. Fithian, President, Albert H. Nickerson, and John F. Price. The meeting convened with the Pledge of Allegiance. Commissioner Fithian asked the audience to remain standing for a moment of silence for the victims and their families of the Denver Colorado shooting and the Kentucky Police Officer that was shot while in his car on duty. Let us all hope this type of activity ends soon.

Shelley L. Heller, County Administrator, and Thomas N. Yeager, Attorney, were also present.

PUBLIC HEARING – CODE HOME RULE BILL 2-2023, INDUSTRIAL STRUCTURES IN 301 CORRIDOR

A public hearing was held for the proposed Code Home Rule Bill 2-2023, Industrial Structures In 301 Corridor. Public information regarding the hearing and minutes are posted on the County's website <https://www.kentcounty.com/commissioners/meeting-agenda>.

At Commissioner Fithian's request, the Board took a brief recess at the conclusion of the public hearing.

ACTION ITEMS

The following Fiscal Year 2024 Budget actions were submitted to the Board for approval:

1. Resolution 2023-08, Establishing the Kent County Tax Levy, July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024. Real Property is \$1.022 on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) of real property. Public Utilities is \$2.55 on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) of property subject to taxation for County purposes. Business Personal Property Tax on Public Utilities is \$2.55 on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) of property subject to taxation for County purposes. On a motion by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved Resolution 2023-08 as presented.
2. Resolution 2023-09, Adoption of Income Tax Rate. The rate is 3.20 percent of an individual's Maryland taxable income. On a motion by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved Resolution 2023-09 as presented.
3. Resolution 2023-10, Establishing Water and Sewer Service Rates. There is a 4% increase in the water and sewer rates from FY2023. On a motion by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved Resolution 2023-10 stating a 4% increase as presented.
4. Resolution 2023-11, Adoption of the FY2024 Budget. On a motion by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved Resolution 2023-11, FY2024 budget as presented.

CONSENT ITEMS

On a motion by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the following items:

1. Regular Session Minutes, June 6, 2023
2. Liquor Minutes, June 6, 2023
3. Public Hearing Minutes, June 6, 2023

HUMAN RESOURCES

Jim Miller, Director, Human Resources, requested to fill the Kent County Family Center Child Development Teacher vacancy. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the recommended candidate for a conditional offer.

OFFICE OF FINANCE

Pat Merritt, Chief Finance Officer, Finance Department, advised the contract with the current auditors S B & Company LLC expires at the end of FY2023. The County has had a multi-year relationship with this vendor and has been extremely satisfied with their services. The Finance department received a proposal to continue services, which piggybacks off the recent contract with Washington County that was competitively bid. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the request as presented.

KENT COUNTY DETENTION CENTER

Steven Wallace, Captain; Lacrishia Scarborough, Corporal; and Monaca Stickland, Officer; Kent County Detention Center (KCDC), presented an agreement for medical and mental health services for inmates. These services are currently under contract with WellPath, and the original service agreement had been amended by extension/renewal multiple times over the years, and many aspects of the agreement changed. WellPath has been unable to perform at the full capacity of its contractual obligations. WellPath presented a proposed extension for FY2024 in the amount of \$635,965.00, significantly higher than the FY2023 proposal of \$406,630.68. A second vendor, PrimeCare Medical, Inc., submitted a proposal that piggybacks off an existing contract with Cecil County Correctional Facility. PrimeCare Medical, Inc.'s proposal came in with the same medical and mental health service coverages as WellPath, with an intended start date of July 17, 2023, and was priced at \$741,669.84. Although the proposal is higher than the current vendor, staff requests approval to contract with PrimeCare Medical, Inc., based on their rapport, professional standing, and the good reviews of other clients. KCDC would like to extend WellPath's Services from June 30th, 2023, to July 16th, 2023, a termination date that has been mutually discussed and agreed upon, and effective July 17, 2023, PrimeCare begin its services. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved to sign a Medical and

Mental Health Services Contract with PrimeCare Medical Inc., effective as of July 17, 2023, in the amount of \$741,669.84 for Fiscal Year 2024.

Officer Stickland requested the award of a food services contract for inmate meals. Officer Stickland explained that Trinity Services Group, Inc. submitted a contract proposal for a three (3) year period with price increases each year. KCDC most often falls into the 21-30 meals served range (\$8.100 for FY2024, \$8.505 for FY2025, and \$8.930 for FY2026). Pricing will continue on a sliding scale per the number of inmates served. Trinity Services Group, Inc., was the sole bidder to the Request for Proposal (RFP) # DC 23-10. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously eliminated the staff meals and only feed the inmates due to the current financial situation the County is in. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved signing the Trinity Services Group Contract for inmate meals from July 1, 2023, to June 31, 2026.

KENT COUNTY INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Scott Boone, Director, Information Technology, presented two requests:

- Purchasing approval of the Alliance Technology Group to piggyback off Maryland DOIT Contract 060B2490022 in the amount of \$71,815.00 for the purchase of firewalls and support. To streamline processes, Kent County Information Technology (KCIT) proposed to install new firewalls with a five-year support contract which is reflected in the department's FY2024 operating budget and will be prepaid. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the contract with Alliance Technology Group and to piggyback off MD DOIT Contract 060B2490022 in the amount of \$71,815.00 for the purchase of firewalls and five (5) years of support.
- Approval of the purchase requisition for the fourth year of the Central Square Contract in the amount of \$139,936.22. The County Commissioners entered into an agreement with Central Square in July 2019 for a five-year term. The final year of the five-year contract term is July 1, 2023-June 30, 2024, in the amount of \$139,936.22. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the purchase requisition for the fourth year of the Central Square Contract in the amount of \$139,936.22.

UPPER SHORE WORKFORCE INVESTMENT BOARD

Dan Schneckenburger, Executive Director, Upper Shore Workforce Investment Board (USWIB) gave an overview of the Upper Shore Workforce Area, which is composed of five counties - Caroline, Dorchester, Kent, Queen Anne's, and Talbot. The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) requires a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the WIOA Partners, the USWIB, and the Upper Shore Counties. The MOU records the understanding of all parties regarding the operation and management of the American Job Centers in the Upper Shore Area. Kent County's American Job Center is located at 115A S.

Lynchburg Street, Chestertown, MD 21620. Mr. Schneckenburger requested Kent County's concurrence and approval of the MOU. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the Local Workforce Development Area Memorandum of Understanding 2023-2025 for the Upper Shore Workforce Investment Board.

PUBLIC WORKS

Mike Moulds, Director, Public Works Department, presented five items for the Commissioners' review:

- The FY2024 Cooperative Weed Control Agreement - The Maryland Department of Agriculture provides technical support for the County's Noxious Weed Control Program through an annual Cooperative Agreement. This is at no cost to the County. Currently, the County weed control program is not active due to a lack of field personnel. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the Noxious Weed Control Cooperative Agreement with the Department of Agriculture for FY2024.
- The Cropland Lease Agreement, Village at Kennedyville - The Homeowners Association (HOA) for the Village at Kennedyville has requested the County retain the services of someone to mow the undeveloped Phase 2 land to control overgrowth. The previous developer employed an adjoining property owner to periodically mow the property in return for the use of planting crops on approximately 5 acres. The Department is requesting approval of a Cropland Lease Agreement for maintenance of the undeveloped portion of the Village at Kennedyville. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the signing of a Cropland Lease Agreement with Daniel McHenry for maintenance of the undeveloped land at the Village at Kennedyville.
- Parks and Recreation Worton Park LED Lighting Upgrade Contract Revision - The vendor (Musco) requested two (2) minor revisions to the County's General Terms & Conditions for the Orem Field LED Light Upgrade project. There is no change to the contract amount or project costs. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the Worton Park LED Lighting Upgrade Contract, dated May 9, 2023, as revised on May 19, 2023.
- Water and Wastewater Division Sewer Allocation Request - The Division of Water and Wastewater Services received a request for a sewer allocation for a single-family lot on Carter Avenue on the Spring Cove service area at TM 0050, Parcel 0115, Lot 19. This lot is located within the planned sewer area. The allocation fee is \$11,800.00. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved one Sewer Allocation for a lot at the location of Tax Map 0050, Parcel 0115, Lot 19.

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT (ARPA) FUNDS

- Water and Wastewater Division, Worton Lagoon Project – The previously approved contract on January 24, 2023, with Denali Water Solutions is for the removal and disposal of sludge from the Worton Wastewater Treatment Plant Lagoon No.1. The contract was based on the removal of 1,250 dry tons of material. The contractor and construction manager are now estimating that the actual quantity as the project is concluding, will be 610 tons. As a result, the department made an inquiry to explore the processing of an estimated 75 dry tons of sludge in the plant digesters. The original contract was for \$1,400,500.00 to be paid from ARPA funds. The estimated final cost for the lagoon sludge removal is \$704,180.00. The department negotiated with the contractor for the additional work for a cost of \$111,600.00. The proposed Change Order adds \$30,000.00 to the existing contract amount. A final rectifying change order will adjust the contract amount based on the lower actual quantity of solids. The funds to pay for the project are paid through ARPA. The Department recommends approval of the change order to take advantage of a portion of the remaining funds while the contractor is still mobilized on site. It is anticipated that the final cost of the project will allow the remaining ARPA funds estimated at \$784,000.00 to be proposed to be used toward replacing the existing sludge press at Worton. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved Change Order No.1 in the amount of \$30,000.00 for the removal of sludge from the Worton Wastewater Treatment Plant digesters under an existing contract with Denali Water Solutions.

A copy of the ARPA Spend Plan outlining the approved expenditures to date was provided to the Commissioners for informational purposes.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR

Ms. Heller, on behalf of Rosemary Ramsey Granillo, Director, Kent County Local Management Board, presented items:

- First Amendment to Minary's Dream Alliance, Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) – a budget increase for Minary's Dream Academy's after-school program from the Children's Cabinet Interagency Fund funding. The additional funds will allow for an overnight experience at Echo Hill Outdoor School. The total not-to-exceed (NTE) ceiling for the project increased by \$9,989.00; from \$90,000.00 to \$99,989.00. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the First Amendment to the MOA with Minary's Dream Alliance.
- Findlay House Global Contract Amendment – A budget modification for implementing the “Y.O.U.R.” Kent County Youth Leadership Academy at Kent County High School was reflected in the Amendment presented. The modification increases the contract amount to \$61,909.00, an increase of \$18,000.00. This extends the period of the Leadership Academy and includes a culminating event on June 10, 2023, Art Works

Mental Health Awareness Symposium. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson; the Commissioners unanimously approved the Findlay House Global contract amendment.

Ms. Heller, on behalf of Jamie Williams, Director, Economic and Tourism Development, presented two items:

- Request to reallocate \$15,000.00 from Salaries and Benefits to Operating funds due to actual expenditure activity. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the reallocation of \$15,000.00 from Salaries and Benefits to Operating within the Economic and Tourism Development Departmental Budget.
- Request to appoint a candidate to fill an unexpired term on the Economic and Tourism Development Commission (ETDC). Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Nickerson and seconded by Commissioner Price, the Commissioners unanimously appointed Judy Gifford to a three-year term to the ETDC.

COUNTY ATTORNEY

Thomas N. Yeager, County Attorney, explained he has been working with Tanja M. Rucci, Land Acquisition and Disposal Lease Management and Procurement on the Intergovernmental Lease - By and Between the Board of County Commissioners of Kent County, Maryland, and Lessor, the State of Maryland, for use of the District Court of Maryland, Kent County Courthouse. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the term of the Lease of five (5) years, and subject to Section 7 of the State of Maryland Lease General Terms and Conditions, set forth in Addendum A, shall commence on July 1, 2023.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR

Ms. Heller, on behalf of Wendy Keen, Supervisor of Special Education/Early Intervention Services, explained an interagency program with the Kent County Department of Social Services and Kent County Health Department. The Infant and Toddlers program provides early intervention for students, birth – three years of age that have a 25% delay in any of the five developmental domains. The program is free of charge to Kent County children. Ms. Keen requested the participation of an elected official to serve as the county representative on the local interagency coordinating council. The responsibilities include attending four meetings in October, December, February, and May, annually. The meetings include discussions on how the program can better serve the residents of Kent County who have children with delays or disabilities. Discussion took place. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Fithian, the Commissioners unanimously appointed Commissioner Nickerson to serve as the County Representative on the Local Interagency Coordinating Council.

The Kent County Ethics Commission has not met within the past few years. Tonya Thomas, Deputy Clerk, II/Secretary of Appointments, contacted a member to ensure there was interest to serve another term on the Commission. The recommendation is to reappoint Lansing Williams to serve an additional 3-year term. This action will bring the 5-member composition current, noting that in October of this year two (2) other members' terms expire and there will be a need to consider appointments. On a motion made by Commissioner Price and seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously approved the recommended candidate to the Ethics Commission for three years. Mr. Williams was first appointed in 2012 and will serve an additional 3-year term.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT

Ms. Heller advised Commissioner Fithian signed the Constant Yield Tax Rate Notice from the Maryland Department of Assessment and Taxation on May 23, 2023, The County property tax rate as of July 1, 2023, will be \$1.022.

PUBLIC COMMENT

The procedures for public comment were in effect and no one offered to comment.

CONTINGENCY FUND

The FY2023 Contingency balance as of June 6, 2023, is \$199,719.00, and the FY2023 use of Fund Balance is \$371,715.00.

CLOSED SESSION

At 1:50 p.m., a motion was made by Commissioner Price, seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, and carried unanimously to go into closed session to discuss two matters. The meeting was closed under the Annotated Code of Maryland, General Provisions Article § 3-305 (b) (1) To discuss the appointment, employment, assignment, promotion, discipline, demotion, compensation, removal, resignation, or performance evaluation of appointees, employees, or officials over whom this public body has jurisdiction; or any other personnel matter that affects one or more specific individuals; and (4) To consider a matter that concerns the proposal for a business or industrial organization to locate, expand, or remain in the State.

Shelley L. Heller, County Administrator; Thomas N. Yeager, County Attorney; Jim Miller, Director, Human Resources; Mike Moulds, Director, Public Works; and Sondra M. Blackiston, Clerk/KATE Manager, were also in attendance.

1st MATTER - PROPOSAL FOR A BUSINESS TO LOCATE IN KENT COUNTY

Topic to be discussed: Business Proposal from an entity looking to start a business within the County limits.

Reason for closing: The proposal from a business looking to locate in the County limits is confidential.

Commissioner Fithian shared that an interested person approached him about a proposed plan to open a business. The Board requested staff obtain copies of any support letters in connection to the proposed business.

2nd MATTER - PERSONNEL

Topic to be discussed: Personnel matters specific to adding or eliminating specific job positions, qualifications, and the compensation of individual positions.

Reason for closing: Personnel matters relating to specific employees are private.

Commissioner Nickerson shared a concern that he was made aware of over the weekend. The Board engaged in a lengthy discussion with staff. Recommendations were discussed. Staff supports the above-mentioned recommendations.

At 3:00 p.m., a motion was made by Commissioner Price, seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, and carried unanimously to adjourn the closed session and reconvene in an open session.

OPEN SESSION

Commissioner Price summarized the Board discussed two matters in a closed session. The first item was a business proposal, and no action was taken at this point. Staff will further explore the request. The second item was a personnel request. The Commissioners are expecting staff to proceed as directed. On a motion made by Commissioner Price, seconded by Commissioner Nickerson, the Commissioners unanimously agreed with the summary as presented.

At 3:02 p.m., on a motion by Commissioner Nickerson and seconded by Commissioner Price, the Commissioners unanimously approved adjourning the meeting. The Board is scheduled to meet again on Tuesday, June 27, 2023, at 10:00 a.m.

PUBLIC HEARING

County Commissioners Ronald H. Fithian, Albert Nickerson, and John F. Price were in attendance as well as Shelley L. Heller, County Administrator, Thomas N. Yeager, County Attorney, and Bill Mackey, Director, Planning, Housing, and Zoning.

Thomas N. Yeager, County Attorney, read the public hearing procedures for testifying. Mr. Yeager stated the public notice was duly advertised and included as part of the record. The rules for a public hearing were in effect.

CODE HOME RULE BILL NO. 2-2023, INDUSTRIAL STRUCTURES IN 301 CORRIDOR

The public hearing commenced at 10:03 a.m. in the County Commissioners' Hearing Room, R. Clayton Mitchell, Jr., Kent County Government Center, 400 High Street, Chestertown, MD. A public hearing for the purpose of discussing Code Home Rule Bill No. 2-2023, Industrial Structures In 301 Corridor, AN ACT to amend Chapter 222, Zoning, of the Public Local Laws of Kent County, Maryland, also known as the Kent County Land Use Ordinance, in order to update Article V. District Regulations, Section 11. Commercial District, § 11.5 Density, Area, Height, Width, and Yard Requirements, by adding a new provision to regulate the height of industrial structures in general and by adding a new provision to regulate the permitted height of industrial structures in the 301 Corridor; to update Article V. District Regulations, Section 14. Employment Center District, § 14.5 Density, Height, Width, Bulk, and Fence Requirements, by adding a new provision to regulate the permitted height of industrial structures in the 301 Corridor; to update Article V. District Regulations, Section 15. Industrial District, § 15.5 Density, Height, Width, and Fence Requirements, by adding a new provision to regulate the permitted height of industrial structures in the 301 Corridor; and to update Article XI, Definitions, Section 2. Definitions, by adding a new definition for the Route 301 Corridor, inserted as item #278.25.

Bill Mackey, Director, Planning, Housing, and Zoning (PHZ) summarized the intent of the legislation and explained the legislative process thus far. An illustrative map of the proposed Route 301 corridor was included with the public hearing materials.

Commissioner Fithian called for a brief recess and the hearing resumed at 12:05 p.m.
